

PLANNING PROGRAM FOR THE NEW YEAR

The program planning meeting is an every-member opportunity to review existing League positions and select the issues upon which League will spend time, talent, energy and money. Local and state Leagues may choose to make no recommendations regarding possible new or updated positions—but also have the option to propose one new study, one review/update of an existing position, and/or one concurrence. Dropping a position is also an option.

Program categories to be considered include:

- Government: the Ohio Constitution, Apportionment/Districting, State Government Finance
- Social Policy: Primary and Secondary Education, Higher Education, Juvenile Justice, Capital Punishment, Human Trafficking
- Natural Resources: Water, Solid Waste, Hazardous Materials and Hazardous Waste, Land Use, Interbasin Transfer of Water, Great Lakes Ecosystem

Based on local League responses, a proposed program will be developed by the LWVO board of directors. At Convention, recommended and non-recommended items will be discussed and debated. Delegates will then adopt the 2015-2017 state program.

LWVO greatly appreciates the time and expertise your League devotes to giving LWVO thoughtful guidance on the state program for 2015-2017.

Deadline for the LWVCA, using the outcome of this meeting, to approve and send our recommendations to LWV Ohio.

LWV Ohio considers the recommendations from local Leagues and selects the Proposed Program.

March through May
Local Leagues review the Proposed Program. LWVCA may wish to use the League network to rally support for recommended and non-recommended items.

May 15-17
State Convention delegates debate and adopt a 2015-2017 program.

The League of Women Voters was founded on Feb. 14, 1920, by Carrie Chapman Catt during the National American Woman Suffrage Association convention. Six months later, the Nineteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, giving women the right to vote after a 72-year struggle.

That same year, the Woman Suffrage Committee of Greater Cincinnati met at the Woman's

City Club and voted to become the League of Women Voters of the Cincinnati Area with Martha B. Taft serving as the first president.

OUR HERO AT CINCINNATI JOB CORPS CENTER

A call from LWVCA office to contact Sharon Thompson at the Cincinnati Job Corps Center to speak to students there on ballot issues turned out to be one of the most rewarding experiences I have had as a League member. When I got to the Job Corps, I met Sharon Thompson, Business and Community Liaison and Work-Based Learning Coordinator. I learned that she had been very proactive in encouraging students there to

vote. She had already taken them to Board Of Elections to register to vote and was going to transport them that week to vote in person.

The small group of eight students and three teachers was attentive, though the students were not highly engaged. I struggled to make the presentation relevant, as ballot issues about funding did not apply to them. None were homeowners; some were not from the area. I tried to convince them that all the issues

were to help people with addiction, mental health care, and health care for adults and children without insurance -- all who would not get this help without the funding these ballot issues would provide. Exercising their right to vote could help others tremendously.

Sharon Thompson is my hero and deserves a standing ovation for her efforts to encourage and assist these young citizens in exercising their most important right of citizenship---their right to vote!!

CINCINNATI CITIZENS POLICE ACADEMY OFFERS GLIMPSE INTO POLICE POLICY

I attended the Citizens Police Academy to better understand the police training in the wake of the unrest in Ferguson, MO due to the shooting of Michael Brown, an un-armed black teenager, by a white police officer, Darren Wilson. I am writing these words while more unrest is happening due to the grand jury's no-indictment verdict.

No matter where you stand, I highly recommend that you attend the next session of the Citizens Police Academy offered by the Cincinnati Police. It is worth it. Really. The Citizens Police Academy is a program designed to provide better understanding between citizens and the police through education.

Attending this course is vital to understand how the police operate; to give comments and to see all the initiatives that are

happening; to see how far Cincinnati has come since our own un-armed black teenager shooting of Timothy Thomas and the riots that followed the shooting in 2001; to learn of the initiatives and trainings that were put in place following the Cincinnati Collaborative Agreement; and to consider how many more steps we could take as citizens and as League members to further improve the police training and strengthen the relationship between the police and the community. We do need to keep in mind that the policemen/women are the result of the police academy recruiting, screening and training program. They are the result of the policies in place and the quality control on their implementation.

The Citizens Police Academy is an extensive and comprehensive program. There are sessions focusing on the laws of arrest, the use of force, drug awareness, mental health response team, gangs,

domestic violence, traffic stops, SWAT team, firearms simulator, terrorism early warning group, criminal investigation process and police professional standards. My favorite session was by Chief Jeffrey Blackwell and detailed the initiatives he has put in place to build trust and communication in the community.



We all need to participate to foster a partnership between the citizens and the police. You and me included.

A Member's Insights on Policing

League member Eleanora Fusco drew on her international experience for insight while attending Cincinnati Citizen's Police Academy. Dr. Fusco believes that one key difference is the prevalence of guns in the United States. In the US, she writes, "police have to assume that you are armed, and it is difficult for a police officer to collaborate if they are feeling that their life is threatened. In Canada and Europe, where criminals have guns but average civilians do not, the police tend to be more collaborative because they do not feel a constant life threat."

Another lesson Dr. Fusco draws from Europe concerns the use of traffic cameras to minimize bias and free up police resources. In Europe, she writes, "there is an extensive use of cameras to monitor traffic and collect information about

violations. They even send the ticket overseas -- as my husband can attest!"

Another insight Eleanora Fusco drew from her citizen police academy experience is more universal: "We all have biases – even I, who have studied their effect," she writes. "We are born with them; they are part of our unconscious decision-making system. Generally, we tend to attribute positive characteristics and attitudes toward people similar to us and negative characteristics and attitudes toward people different from us. It is important to consider that unconscious biases affect both police and civilians, causing misperception of situations and influencing memory and recollection. Awareness of one's own biases helps reduce their impact. Training on unconscious biases and their effect on decision-making, especially under stressful

conditions, might be very useful for the police force."

Dr. Fusco remarks that the Cincinnati Collaborative Agreement has led to numerous improvements: more training in recognizing mental health concerns and interacting with people who are mentally ill; more training in realistic situations such as low-light conditions; more computers and cameras in the officers' cruisers; and a Citizens Complaint Authority that completes independent reviews of complaints regarding police officers' behaviors. However, as she notes, these improvements remain local to Cincinnati and the Cincinnati Police Department. Dr. Fusco calls for a central approach to police training and hiring so that best practices can be implemented throughout an entire region.

NEW REPORT SHOWS GAP IN JOBS AND GENDER FORECAST

On Dec. 2, the Women’s Fund of The Greater Cincinnati Foundation released a

report that shines a light on the fact that, based on current trends, job growth in our region is not likely to result in uniform prosperity for both genders.

show that the handful of female-dominated occupation groups were found to have a medium annual wage of \$40,000 or less in 2012. Unfortunately, that income is insufficient to cover basic costs for a single mother of two children.



Entitled “PULSE: 2020 Jobs and Gender Outlook,” the report notes that, “In 2020, 4 [out] of every 7 women are projected to work in occupations with a median wage that is inadequate to support a woman with one child without public assistance.”

The Women’s Fund of The Greater Cincinnati Foundation intends that this report “be a tool to help our community succeed with the key initiative of ensuring that 90 percent of our workforce is gainfully employed by 2020. To succeed in this goal, we will need to create a significant shift in the current state of women’s employment.”


You bring the lively discussion and we will provide lunch to keep body and soul together.
